 Body paragraphs explain and support the points that support the writer's thesis. Each body paragraph should contain one major point/idea that must be supported by specific details. For this assignment, each body paragraph should contain a MINIMUM of from the novel. The restates the thesis and makes a personal observation or statement about the work.

Intro
a. Provides a
b. Mentions and
c. Includes 2-3 sentence that may identify main characters d. Ends with (always the last sentences of the intro) (Except on the ACT writing
test!!)
Body Paragraphs
a. Start with a and
b. Use at least direct quotes or passages to support the thesis and topic sentence
Conclusion a. Starts with a concluding transition (In conclusion, In summary, Clearly, then) b. Restates the writer's
