

What I Learned: This section finally allows you to focus on what you have learned as a result of your research.

How do I start?

1. Read articles thoroughly.
2. Highlight any information that answers the questions you need answered.
3. Go back to the sample papers on the homework page.

What findings or conclusions have you arrived at?

What sources have you used to come to these conclusions? You need to be sure to cite your sources here!

Be careful to connect What you have Learned to the question(s) you posed in the What I Want to Know section of your paper.

Be certain to use MLA documentation in this section and cite your sources correctly. Direct quotes must ALWAYS be in quotation marks. Cite a minimum of five sources. Also, since this section focuses on what you've learned, you will generally need about three citations per page or one per paragraph. Personal interviews do count as sources.

Discuss your results and give support. Describe the findings of your research. Write at least one paragraph for each major research result. Support your findings with quotations, paraphrases, and summaries of information from sources.

Remember **ICE—intro quote or borrowed info, cite it, explain significance or link it to topic.**
